ROBOTRAFFIC

FJA's Robotraffic team returned to Israel in the spring of 2023 to participate in the **Technion Robotraffic competition! The** team began their trip in Haifa where they toured the Technion campus and met the **Technion Biomedical Engineering** department. There, they saw a demonstration of the motion capture lab. Students also toured the 3D bioprinting lab where the Biomedical Engineering department is working on 3D Printing tissues to eventually be able to print meat and organs. On the day of the competition, the FJA team competed against schools from Argentina, Mexico, and Israel, and came in 4th place overall. The team was awarded for successful participation.





MMCC TEAM WINS FIRST PRIZE

FJA successfully defended 2022's First Prize at the Maimonides Moot Court Competition, held on Sunday, March 19, 2023 at the Pearlstone Conference Center, near Baltimore. First Prize winning team members were: Samantha Caminker '24 (captain), Eliyah Fradkin '24, and Esti Klein '24. FJA's other MMCC team members were first timers: Brody Fleishman '25, Ryan Reinstein '26, and Jesse Weinstein '24, and four year MMCC participant (and multi-year captain) Evan Weitzman '23. This year's seven students and two teams were both all time highs for FJA. Rabbi Elliot Pachter has been FJA's MMCC advisor for the past four years. After three years of Zoom events, this year marked the return to attending in person.





STUDENTS ATTEND MODEL UN CONFERENCE

The FJA Model United Nations (MUN) Club attended Yeshiva University's National Model United Nations (YUNMUN) conference, representing the country of Peru. Students acted as delegates for several committees, including: Commission on the **Development of Science and** Technology, United Nations Environment Programme, United Nations Educations, Scientific and Cultural Organization, United Nations Human Rights Council, World Food Programme, and World Health Organization. Delegates debated a variety of issues with delegates from other "countries" (Jewish schools from across the country), proposing solutions to real-world problems that continue to plague our planet.

WASHINGTON D.C. TRIP

Our juniors and seniors had a great time November 5 - 8, 2023 on FJA's first ever Washington, D.C. trip! They visited the Washington monument and World War II memorial, had a picnic lunch on the national mall, went to Arlington National Cemetery, the Iwo Jima Marine Corps memorial, and the 9/11 memorial at the Pentagon.

Our students had an amazing experience at the Supreme Court. They sat in awe of their surroundings as they watched the dynamic interactions among the nine justices and attorneys before them. They had lunch at the Court before learning about the history and significance of both the institution and the building itself through a docent-led lecture.

They spent the afternoon learning about Congress with a walk through the Rayburn, Longworth, and Cannon office buildings, including a look at the subway that runs underground to the Capitol. They capped their tour with gallery passes to the current House floor where they caught the end of a Rules Committee vote. They also explored the Korean War Memorial, Vietnam War Memorial, and the Lincoln Memorial.

Tuesday, they took a tour of Ford's Theater and the White House, along with the Holocaust Memorial Museum, Botanical Gardens, and the MLK Jr. and Jefferson Memorials. They met up with FJA alumni Josh Cohen '05, Cole Eisenshtadt '15, and Sammi Goldsmith '14 in the evening and chatted about the work that they do.







PRO-ISRAEL RALLY IN WASHINGTON D.C.

The March for Israel on November 14, 2023 was the largest pro-Israel rally in U.S. history. It was an opportunity for Americans to show their support for Israel and condemn rising anti-Semitism around the country. Over 290,000 people attended the rally in person and over 250,000 attended virtually. FJA and Jewish Federation of Detroit sent a cohort of students and staff to attend the rally, but unfortunately due to an alleged "sick-out" by a number of bus-drivers protesting the rally, our students were not able to make it to the March once they arrived in Washington, D.C.

A message from Harry Shaevsky '24 on his experience trying to get to the Pro-Israel Rally in Washington, D.C.:

"Tuesday morning, the FJA contingent of students heading to Washington D.C. was energized for the opportunity to support Israel on the National Mall. Some students, including me, were returning to our nation's capital after last week's four-day trip. Our excitement was quickly squashed at Dulles International Airport, as we were stranded at the airport for 16 hours as a result of a bus driver boycott. This act left me heartbroken as we were the victims of anti-Semitism when our mission was to combat anti-Semitism. As Zionist Jews, now more than ever we must fight to end these acts of hatred and spread our unwavering support for Israel's obligation to defend itself from terrorists."





PRO-ISRAEL RALLY AT FJA



Those students who stayed at FJA on November 14, 2023 were given the opportunity to virtually attend the rally in Washington, D.C. We learned about the history of Israel and Gaza from Mrs. Rebecca Strobehn before live-streaming the events in the capitol.

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YUNMUN CONFERENCE 2024

In February 2024, six members of our Model UN club, accompanied by Ms. Claire Sandau, traveled to Stamford, CT to participate in Yeshiva University's annual Model United Nations (YUNMUN) conference. Playing the roles of delegates to Qatar, our students represented a variety of positions, often ones with which they may not agree. In advocating for Qatar, our students conducted thorough research of the country's interests and policies across a wide range of issues and concerns. This increased their knowledge of world affairs and their appreciation of and facility with research, preparation, communication and critical evaluation. It was a great trip and we are proud of the students that participated in the conference!





FJA WINS MMCC PRIZE FOR THE 3RD YEAR IN A ROW!

In April 2024, for the third consecutive year at the Maimonides Moot Court Competition, our team of Samantha Caminker '24, overall captain, Eliyah Fradkin '24, and Esti Klein '24 won a prize. After two first places, this team, otherwise known as Frankel 3, brought home the 2nd place trophy in their division. Returning participants Ryan Reinstein '26, and captains Brody Fleishman '25 and Jesse Weinstein '24. plus "rookies" Ryan Giles '24, Louie Kowalsky '26, Zeev Maine '26, and Aaron Schuchman '26 all worked hard and performed admirably on behalf of the Jags. MISSION TRIP TO ISRAEL

On March 17, 2024, even as Jewish schools around the country, including FJA, were rethinking their yearly grade level trip to Israel, 7 FJA students and 2 chaperones boarded a flight to Newark for a connecting flight bound for Israel. The cohort included: Spencer Cherrin '25, Eliyah Fradkin '24, Ryan Giles '24, Grace Kleinfeldt '25, Ezra Lupovitch '25, Jacob Miller '25, Caleb Starr '25, Mr. Joe Berstein, and Rabbi Azaryah Cohen.

As a Jewish school, safety and security of students and staff is always a matter of priority. When parents expressed concerns about an Israel trip given the events in Israel post October 7, the school understood, but it also had to contend with a challenge to its fundamental mission - could FJA turn away, in essence abandon Israel, during the time of her greatest need.

The answer was a resounding "no." FJA pivoted to provide any student interested, an opportunity to travel to Israel and volunteer; to lend a hand wherever possible and to give strength and encouragement to our Israeli brothers and sisters.

The 9 person FJA delegation joined 13 other teens from across North America on a 4 day volunteer mission that many agreed was the most important and meaningful trip to Israel they had made. They prepared and packed food for soldiers, assisted with agricultural work, packaged food for the needy, and witnessed the strength and resilience of our people. They had the opportunity to see for themselves that all Israelis, Jewish, Muslim, Bedouin, and Druze, regardless of identity and affiliation, drew strength from each other and reinforced their resolve to work together.

They participated in a variety of activities and volunteered at different organizations in Israel. The group volunteered at Adi Negev, Wadi Attir, and Yad Ezra V'Shulamit and some activities included: cooking at Western Galilee Now, visiting Hostage Square in Tel Aviv, a Druze dinner in Usafia, visiting Kibbutz Reim, a walking tour of Old Jerusalem, and dinner at Machane Yehuda Market. The cohort also saw our former Shinshiniot, Lihi and Aya!

Though the trip was brief, they left Israel proud and resolute - knowing that they are part of an incredible people with a rich heritage and together, they form the strength and purpose to confront and tackle even the most difficult of circumstances - Am Yisrael Chai.













ECLIPSE FIELD TRIPS

Total solar eclipses are dramatic, stunning, and astounding astrological events. Judaism is deeply connected to astronomy, with our calendar following the phases of the moon. Fun fact: solar eclipses will always fall around Rosh Chodesh (the start of a new month).

On Monday, April 8, 2024 (the day before the start of Nissan) students took day trips to various locations in Ohio to view (and learn about) the total solar eclipse. It was an awe-inspiring experience for the students and staff who made the trek to Ohio. The 9th and 10th grade classes traveled to Back to the Wildlife Rehabilitation in Castalia, Ohio, while the 11th and 12th grade classes started their day at the University of Toledo for a tour of their campus before heading to the Toledo Zoo to view the eclipse.

The field trip came about from the FJA Science Department Chair, Mr. Nicholas Mantas. He said, "I made the joke to my class about perhaps in a few years the school can go on a field trip to view the eclipse. Later that day, I was thinking about how the school introduced experiential learning trips and I proposed the idea to administration. I didn't really didn't know how it was going to be perceived but everyone thought it was a great idea. Two years later and I'm so happy that the school got to go and that the weather cooperated with us."

As one of many experiential learning opportunities available at FJA, this experience was especially unique since there will not be another total solar eclipse that crosses the United States until 2044. It was a once-in-a-lifetime field trip and was an informative, fun, and mesmerizing event for many FJA students. Not only were they able to learn about the science behind how eclipses work but they also could observe how this phenomena affected the animals at the rehabilitation center and at the zoo. According to FJA junior Rena Kantor '25 who was at the zoo: "In the 20 minutes before the eclipse, the giraffes were acting weird. They were more active than I have ever seen giraffes... whipping their heads around, running in circles, and sticking their tongues out. During the eclipse, they went inside their building to sleep, and when it was over, they came back out and kept exhibiting that same weird behavior. The zebras however, started fighting in the moments directly after the eclipse. It was so amazing to see how animals reacted during this once in a lifetime experience."











Other students had a lot to say about their general experiences that day. FJA junior, Lillian Moss '25 said: "It was such an amazing experience to get to see the solar eclipse. I was truly in awe getting to see the eclipse in the path of totality. Not only was watching the eclipse entertaining, but it was also so much fun getting to spend the day and bond with all my friends. Overall, the eclipse trip was a day full of fun and I'm so happy I attended!" According to freshman, Gillie Charnas '27: "The eclipse was a great experience to not only learn about, but get to see with my teachers and classmates, in a setting outside of school. It was fun to learn outside of school and the eclipse was super cool."

FJA junior, Ben Royzenblatt '25, was truly wowed by the day, saying: "The immense reality of the eclipse was very overwhelming... The colossal difference between 99% coverage and 100% coverage is INSANE, proving the brobdingnagian amount of light emitted from the sun. Totality was truly amazing... There was a glowing ring emitting around the border of the moon, it was as if it was a shiny rainbow ring. The atmosphere had suddenly become a false night time."

The eclipse trip is just one of the many experiential learning trips that FJA offers. Students have the opportunity to get outside the classroom and enhance their learning in a myriad of ways. This field trip in particular was "stellar" and FJA is so happy to have provided such a unique experience to their students and staff.






JAGS IN COMPETITION















Visual ARTS





2023 MONTANA EXPERIENCE



FJA's class of 2026 spent a week at the beginning of June 2023, camping and learning with members of the Northern Cheyenne Nation in beautiful Lame Deer, Montana. They visited the Little Bighorn Battlefield Monument before arriving at the Northern Chevenne Reservation. The freshmen learned about and built tipis, which they slept in each night! The group also participated in a traditional sweat lodge experience, a beading workshop, and visited the Tribal Council Offices. They learned about tribal history, environmental issues, and cultural practices from tribal elders. From the reservation, they headed to Yellowstone where they visited the hot springs at Lava Creek, and hiked the Norris Geyser Basin.

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2023 PORTLAND COMMUNITY SERVICE EXPERIENCE





FJA's class of 2025 spent a week in Portland, Oregon in the spring of 2023, where they were introduced to the history, culture, and scenery of the Pacific Northwest. While there, they were provided an opportunity to do community service. In keeping with our values of serving the Jewish and general community, and providing tzedek opportunities for students, the sophomores learned about the issue of affordable housing and helped build homes in a "tiny home" community. They learned about some of today's most pressing social issues, including housing, food, and environmental challenges through a Jewish lens. Daily hands-on social and communal work gave the 10th graders an opportunity to deepen their understanding of what Judaism, Jewish history, and Jewish sources have to offer them as agents of positive change.



While in Israel, the juniors also learned about other cultures and religions in Israel, the environmental struggles facing Israel today, visited Yad Vashem, and had the opportunity to do community service.

2023 EUROPE EXPERIENCE

FJA's 12th graders traveled to Poland and Prague with Ramah Institute Israel. Students learned about the centuries of thriving Jewish communities that existed in pre-Shoah Poland. They then learned what life was like in a shtetl, visited the concentration camps, and explored historic synagogues. After they had a chance to meet current Jewish and non-Jewish college students living in Warsaw today. From Poland the seniors traveled to Prague where they experienced a millennia of Jewish history, walked through the rose garden, visited the Franz Kafka Museum, and much more!







2024 MONTANA EXPERIENCE








The class of 2027 traveled to Montana at the end of May 2024. Their first day they visited the Little Bighorn Battlefield Monument and arrived at the Northern Cheyenne Reservation, where they setup camp at Lame Deer High School. The next day they learned about and built tipis, which they had the option to sleep in! Students had a thrilling time!



VEGAN JACKFRUIT BRISKET (JEWISH-STYLE)

Tender, meaty, juicy, flavorful Jewish style vegan brisket made out of jackfruit! This plant-based version of brisket is perfect for the Jewish holidays.

Prep Time 10 minutes Cook Time 1hour Total Time 1hour 10minutes Servings 6

Ingredients

- 2 20 oz cans young green jackfruit
- 1 diced yellow onion
- 5 cubed russet potatoes
- 1 cup chopped carrots
- 1 tsp smoked paprika

- 1 tsp garlic powder
- 1 tsp salt
- 1 tsp pepper
- 2 cups plain tomato sauce
- 3 tbsp ketchup
- 2 tbsp tomato paste

Instructions

- 1. Preheat oven to 425 degrees F. Rinse and drain the canned jackfruit. Gently shred and pull apart the jackfruit with your hands then saute for 10 minutes in a pan to get rid of some of the moisture.
- 2. In a casserole dish or roasting pan, add the onions to the bottom of the pan. Then, add the jackfruit to the center of the pan. Add the potatoes and carrots around the jackfruit. Season the jackfruit with paprika, garlic and salt then mix.
- 3. Top the jackfruit with tomato sauce, tomato paste, and ketchup. Cover and bake for 1 hour or until the potatoes are fork tender.
- 4. Enjoy!
